The Taxman Cometh

If there's one fly in the otherwise laudable Ballard Marine Industry ointment, it surely must be what many consider Washington State's archaic, and convoluted tax laws, as they pertain to recreational vessels registered *outside* Washington State. If, as an out of state boat owner/operator, you are considering making your way to Ballard, or anywhere in Washington State for that matter, you must be familiar with these rules to avoid running afoul of the regulations, violation of which could expose you to taxation of up to 9.5% of the fair market value of your vessel.

With a cruising permit, non-resident individually owned vessels may remain in Washington waters for sixty days, which may be extended to six months, provided a temporary Washington State Vessel permit is obtained. There's more, the rules differ for vessels owned by individuals vs. entities, i.e. corporations, LLCs etc, and differ still more for trusts. As I said, it's complex, and this is just for vessels cruising in Washington, there are more rules for vessels being repaired or refit.

Each time I asked about regulations during the rounds of Ballard I received a slightly different answer, which made it abundantly clear that they are anything but clear, even to residents of the state working in the marine industry. I posted a query on the Nordhavn Owners' site, which elicited several detailed responses, and a few pleas for clarity, from residents and those who had cruised in the area. One of those respondents recommended that those bringing vessels to Washington for an extended stay, for a refit for instance, should consult with an attorney.

As word got out that I was working on this article several folks in the Washington State marine industry shared with me their frustration, a common sentiment being, 'It's less complex for a boat owner or operator, American and otherwise, to take his or her boat to Canada for a refit than to Washington State." If you think that sounds ludicrous, you aren't alone. I believe the hoops boat owners are made to jump through when visiting

Washington, to cruise or undertake repairs, represent a hindrance to the marine industry and represent a net loss for the State's tax coffers.

In an effort to more fully understand the nuances of the laws I took the advice of the above-mentioned respondent, I consulted Seattle-based attorney, Fred Robinson of Carney, Bradley and Spellman, <u>www.carneylaw.com</u>, for insight. He specializes in working with the marine industry and tax related issues. In the interest of keeping the coverage narrowly focused, I'll concentrate on what he shared, as it relates to those coming to Washington for refit and repair work.

All vessels, regardless of ownership, i.e individuals or what tax folks call "a natural person" or entity, a corporation, LLC etc, may remain in Washington State while under a vessel repair affidavit, without sales or use tax exposure. Thus, out of state yacht owners should have few concerns about bringing their yacht to Ballard, or anywhere in Washington State, for extended refit or repair work, and the affidavit is renewable. That's straight forward enough and not too daunting for those contemplating a trip to Washington for an extended project. The terms of the repair affidavit, however, are very specific, including an exclusion of use. That is, the owner cannot use his or her vessel while under the auspices of the vessel repair affidavit, however, he or she may be aboard to oversee work the work. If the vessel is sea trialed, while the owner may be aboard, a representative of the facility carrying out the work named in the affidavit "must be in control" of the vessel.
